

Covid-19 vaccines, treatment and costs

Getting vaccinated for Covid-19 is more important than ever with the spread of Omicron, a new and more contagious variant of the virus. Vaccines are free, easily available and safe. The [federal government](#) is providing vaccines free of charge to all people living in the United States, regardless of their immigration or health insurance status.

Children and adolescents: All Persons 5 years of age and older are eligible to receive the Covid vaccine in Florida. The Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is authorized for individuals 5 years of age or older. To obtain the vaccine in Florida, individuals 5-17 years of age must be accompanied by a guardian.

Persons 12 and older are eligible for the [Covid “booster” vaccine](#), a third dose of the Covid vaccine recommended due to the spread of the more contagious Omicron variant. A [booster shot](#) will increase your immune response.

Homebound - If you, or someone you know, is unable to leave the house, let the vaccine come to you. Residents may call 1-800-96-ELDER (1-800-963-5337) or email homeboundvaccine@em.myflorida.com to set up a free appointment.

Uninsured: Options for access to affordable healthcare.

If you get sick from Covid and need medical care but can't afford it - either in initial stages or due to continuing “Long Covid” symptoms and healthcare needs, you can get covered for health care in many ways:

Apply for [Medicaid](#) anytime in Florida if you fall into one of these categories: people with disabilities or over 65, former foster children until age 26, pregnant women or extremely low-income parents qualify. In addition, financial assistance for medical care is available at some local hospitals. In Miami, for example, Jackson Health has a financial assistance program as a designated [local charity care hospital](#).

Uninsured Florida residents can also access low-cost healthcare at [Federally Qualified Health Centers](#) in their communities

Get health insurance: www.healthcare.gov.

You can enroll in an Affordable Care Act Marketplace health plan. More people now qualify for subsidies and plans with new, lower costs, even zero premiums at no cost to you, that make the monthly premiums more affordable. There's an open enrollment period through January 15, 2022 and a special enrollment period open anytime due to change of circumstances (loss of private insurance, new job or move, for example). There are several ways to apply and enroll:

- Find help through an agent/broker: Healthcare.gov/find-assistance/.
