Dear Friends:

As we turn the corner on what has been a difficult year, Florida Health Justice Project continues to work hard to assure access to affordable healthcare for all Floridians.

We are reaching out to you again to provide information on healthcare programs, resources and other information you may find helpful as we all continue to navigate the Covid-19 pandemic, including where to get vaccines, and how to access low-cost or free healthcare. This newsletter also has information on how to sign up for healthcare insurance and other programs, including those for seniors.

Get health insurance: www.healthcare.gov.

You can enroll in an Affordable Care Act Marketplace health plan with more savings through **August 15, 2021** due to the [coronavirus disease 2019 \(COVID-19\) emergency](#). After August 15, you can apply if you have certain life changes or qualify for Medicaid or CHIP. More people, including [those who received unemployment](#) in 2020-2021, now qualify for subsidies and plans with new, lower costs.

There are several ways to apply and enroll:

- Apply online at www.healthcare.gov
- Call the Marketplace Call Center at 1-800-318-2596; help is available in 200 languages!
- Find help through an agent/broker: Healthcare.gov/find-assistance/.

Uninsured: Options for access to affordable healthcare.

You can apply for [Medicaid](#) anytime in Florida if you fall into one of these categories: people with disabilities or over 65, former foster children until age 26, pregnant women or extremely low-income parents qualify. In addition, financial assistance for medical care is available at some local hospitals. In Miami, for example, Jackson Health has a financial assistance program as a designated [local charity care hospital](#). Uninsured Florida residents can also access low-cost healthcare at [Federally Qualified Health Centers](#) in their communities.

Florida's front-line workers are most likely to be uninsured

According to a [new report](#) by [Georgetown University Center for Children and Families](#), almost half of all adults working in Florida without health insurance are employed in the hospitality, retail, and administrative/support/waste management service industries, including cashiers, cooks, waiters and waitresses, retail salespersons, and construction workers, all essential jobs during the pandemic.

If Florida expanded Medicaid, approximately 789,800 uninsured workers caught in the “coverage gap,” (earning too much for Medicaid but too little to qualify for a subsidized Affordable Care Act policy), or 33 percent of the state’s uninsured adult population, would gain health insurance. Despite generous new financial incentives for expansion in the American Rescue Plan, as well as [nearly \\$200 million annually in savings](#) the state could see even without the new financial incentives, Florida remains one of 12 states that haven’t expanded Medicaid. The [federal government](#) is providing vaccines free of charge to all people living in the United States, regardless of their immigration or health insurance status.
